Vicar's Letter April 2020 (18. 03. 2020)

I suspect these thoughts will be out of date before the ink is dry on this magazine, the way things are changing so rapidly. Maybe some people will be installing bidets because of a lack of toilet rolls, and vodka will be being sold in the pharmacy because of shortage of hand sanitiser. Walking poles in Silchester will not be used for walking but extended to their full length and used to measure the two metre gap between us. But maybe many people will be suffering directly or indirectly from the virus with some critically ill or sadly passed away.

How are we coping? With black humour; with tears; with worry and anxiety; with support from family, neighbours and friends? I am particularly fearful for the mental health of those in the high risk categories as they experience loneliness and fear of the unknown.

The Bible says "Do not fear, for I am with you, do not be dismayed, for I am your God. I will strengthen you and help you, I will uphold you with my righteous right hand" (Isaiah 41). These verses do not say you will be healed, but rather God will help you through whatever you face. Prayer does sometimes result in healing or protection and it is right we should pray for that but in a world like ours, which spends so much of its time out of tune with God, it is perhaps not surprising that prayer does not always result in what we want. But whatever you think about prayer, the one thing that God guarantees is that, whether you are a believer or a prayer or not, God is always with you ready to strengthen us and help us whatever the situation we face, if we will just turn to him. The simple prayer "God help me" has been responded to by God millions of times over the centuries.

I have no magic answer as to why sometimes the answer is complete protection or healing, but other times apparent silence, but from my experience I do believe that somehow God holds me together and supports me through the worst situation. I can't offer much more than that, but for me there have been times when that has meant everything.

At St Mary the Virgin sadly there will be no services until further notice, but the church will always be open for prayer. Inside the church there is a prayer tree on the prayer table on which to hang your prayers which will be taken and prayed over. There are words of encouragement and comfort, and prayer sheets for you to take away. You can go in and quietly sit or kneel, or if no-one else is there, go in and shout to God, or even sing. There will be regular prayers, Bible passages and "thoughts for the week" on the website, or sent to you if you sign up by contacting me.

At the time of writing, weddings and funerals could continue, though numbers of attendees may have to be limited, and different processes are being put in place for the reading of banns. Unfortunately Christenings may have to be postponed unless there are health or other good reasons, but I will be contacting those currently arranged.

As long as I keep healthy I am here for you to ask for help, to talk with, to berate for prayers seemingly unanswered, and to join in celebration and thanks for those prayers clearly answered.

You might think I have a hot line to God, but I don't know what the future holds and I don't understand what's going on any better than the rest, but I hang on to the above Bible verse with my shaky human faith, and I pray earnestly for this whole community, whether or not you ever walk through the door of the church - But if, at the time of writing, you know where I could get a toilet roll from, I'm sure God would bless you enormously!

COVID-19

COVID-19 is a new illness that can affect your lungs and airways. It's caused by a virus called coronavirus

Stay at home if you have coronavirus symptoms

Stay at home if you have either:

- a high temperature you feel hot to touch on your chest or back
- a new, continuous cough this means you've started coughing repeatedly

Do not go to a GP surgery, pharmacy or hospital. You do not need to contact 111 to tell them you're staying at home.

Testing for coronavirus is not needed if you're staying at home.

How long to stay at home?

- if you have symptoms, stay at home for 7 days
- if you live with other people, they should stay at home for 14 days from the day the first person got symptoms

If you live with someone who is 70 or over, has a long-term condition, is pregnant or has a weakened immune system, try to find somewhere else for them to stay for 14 days. If you have to stay at home together, try to keep away from each other as much as possible.

Use the NHS 111 online coronavirus service if:

- you feel you cannot cope with your symptoms at home
- your condition gets worse
- your symptoms do not get better after 7 days

Only call 111 if you cannot get help online

How to avoid catching and spreading coronavirus (social distancing)

Everyone should do what they can to stop coronavirus spreading.

It is particularly important for people who:

- are 70 or over
- have a long-term condition
- are pregnant
- have a weakened immune system

Do

- wash your hands with soap and water often - do this for at least 20 seconds
- always wash your hands when you get home or into work
- use hand sanitiser gel if soap and water are not available
- cover your mouth and nose with a tissue or your sleeve (not your hands) when you cough or sneeze
- put used tissues in the bin immediately and wash your hands afterwards
- avoid close contact with people who have symptoms of coronavirus
- only travel on public transport if you need to
- work from home, if you can
- avoid social activities, such as going to pubs, restaurants, theatres and cinemas
- avoid events with large groups of people
- use phone, online services, or apps to contact your GP surgery or other NHS services

Don't

- do not touch your eyes, nose or mouth if your hands are not clean
- do not have visitors to your home, including friends and family

A record number of people came to Sandi Smithers' talk and slide show about her 'Ride The Rift' adventure. Sandi loves Africa and thrives on personal challenge so when she heard about a cycle ride along the Rift Valley in Kenya it just had to be done! All the more so as it was organised by a group called Charity Links which was raising money for East African Education charities.



Sandi was supported in her training by members of the 'Wobbly Wheels' U3A cycling group, some of whom joined us for Sandi's talk. They cycled 300km, setting up camp along the way, and were rewarded with a Safari on the last day.

Sandi's photos, and some from other members of the group, were excellent and really gave us a flavour of the experience - without all the aches & pains! The places where they camped had amazing scenery and a lot of animals but were obviously well off the normal tourist trail.

We saw photos of elephants, giraffes, a lioness with cubs, baboons, vervet & colobus monkeys. Also hyenas, eland and wildebeest. Some of these visited the camps at night! The group raised over £40,000 of which Sandi raised about £4,500 and work has already begun on renewing the toilet block for the Olooseos Girls School.

Sandi has been tempted by a similar challenge which will take place in Uganda in 2021. 600 km this time. She has already started collecting funds towards this venture. Watch this space......!

Silchester Players

We are delighted to report that we have just heard we have been awarded an "Accolade of Excellence" for our production of "Treasure Island" which took place early in 2019. This has been granted by the National Operatic and Dramatic Association (NODA) of which we are members. As this is our fifth such award in recent years, it is indeed very gratifying that the quality of our productions is gaining wider recognition.

Auditions for our next play, Shakespeare's "The Tempest" took place on 18th February. The cast has now been selected and rehearsals for this ambitious production have started. There are numerous challenges ahead both for actors and stage crew, but we are confident that we can present an exciting and engaging spectacle. The play is being staged on 15/16//22/23 May. Watch for more details in next month's magazine.

An early task is the preparation of scenery as we pride ourselves on the colourful sets we assemble and paint for all our shows. Set building takes place over most weekends leading up to a production and involves a considerable amount of work. For exterior scenes we use canvas backdrops framed with "flats" giving access to the wings. Interiors can be made by attaching several flats together and anchoring them securely on the stage.

Most backdrops and flats are freshly painted for each production. All members of the company lend a hand, particularly in the early stages as often it is necessary to blank out the previous colours before a fresh scene can be created. Those who saw the spectacular throne room in "Snow White" will appreciate that considerable overpainting will be necessary to erase all traces of the deep blues and reds of the Wicked Queen's palace!

One of the challenges we face is the limited amount of space in Silchester Village Hall. Our flats are stored either on or underneath the stage. Unfortunately access below the stage is difficult due to the lack of height. To solve this problem a number of years ago our stage crew constructed long trolleys on runners which can be pulled out into the body of the hall. We share the



understate storage with the nursery and were able to assist them by making a similar trolley for their equipment.

If you pop into the Village Hall on the set building weekend you will see the main room transformed into a workshop. We spread sheets over the floor then rest the flats on tables while they are being painted. They are then propped up against the balcony or the walls while the paint dries.

For a two-week period in February contractors employed by the Parish Council worked on the Common clearing gorse and silver birch to restore it to heathland and allowing heather to flourish. This is in keeping with the requirements of Natural England to maintain the Site of Special Scientific Interest (SSSI). Walkers will notice the much clearer outlook in the NW quadrant of the Common close to Pamber Road and Impstone Road. Despite the largely wet weather bonfires were lit to get rid of the brush. This remains the only cost-effective means of disposal and we are aware that on some days the smoke blew towards residential properties but hope that this didn't inconvenience residents too much. There will be no more contractor work until next Winter.

The regular volunteer work parties on the Common finished at the end of March and will not resume until September. This season a number of well-used paths were cleared leaving a two metre margin either side. Other volunteers have made repairs to the various duck boards around the Common and one new one installed. Given the exceptionally wet conditions on the Common these boards are in very regular use.

The coronavirus outbreak has been a significant item in the news for the past few weeks. As of the time of writing (12/03/2020) there has been one confirmed case of the virus affecting a Hampshire resident, who is being treated in London. Updated information on the spread of the virus and the recommendations from Government for minimising its spread can be found at https://www.gov.uk/guidance/coronavirus-covid-19-information-for-the-public The site provides recommendations for travellers, the current Government actions on containing the virus and also has links to the recommendations for those planning to travel. Please feel free to contact the Parish Council Clerk if you think we may be able to point you in the direction of any available support.

There was discussion in the Basingstoke & Deane council meeting regarding the possible reduction in frequency of collection of kerbside waste bins. There was strong opposition to this proposal and the council have decided that the collection frequency will not be changed. It was also noted that from the evaluation of the waste being placed in the grey/black bins that up to one third of waste going into these bins is suitable for recycling in the green bin. Please check on packaging and similar items to see whether they are recyclable before dumping then in the waste bin. If you find that you often have more recycling than the bin will hold, the council will supply a larger bin on request or even supply a second green bin for regular collection.

Last year the Borough recycled 32% of all waste, an increase from 24% in the previous year. Whilst the recycle rate may look lower compared to other council areas, the Basingstoke & Deane rate includes industrial and commercial waste, not only household waste as some councils report. Recycling is an important part of the fight against climate change and there are an increasing number of items which can be recycled. The Silchester Magazine often gives options for recycling at the School, Pavilion and the monthly Village Market.

The issue of traffic in School Lane during the morning drop off and afternoon pickup was a subject of discussion at the last Parish Council meeting. A number of School Lane residents attended the meeting to voice their concerns on the safety of pedestrians during these periods. The council has limited power to act in this situation, but will be approaching the Highways Authority in Basingstoke to discuss the issue and whether potential solutions exist.



On 7th March the Annual Bark Spread in the Playground was done. There was a great turnout of volunteers - especially considering that a mix-up in the delivery dates meant that the work was not done on the day given in the last Magazine - enabling the 6 pallets to be unloaded and spread in a record 30 minutes. Thanks to all the volunteers who came and made it such an enjoyable exercise. Those who use the Playground regularly will have seen the new donation box by the entrance, provided by the Basingstoke and Deane Council. The playground is funded by donations and maintained largely by volunteers and any donations are very welcome.



The **Hubble Space Telescope** was launched 30 years ago, on 24th April 1990. It was named after Edwin Hubble, an outstanding expert on extragalactic astronomy in the 1920s and 1930s.

The launch, originally scheduled for 1983, had been delayed by technical and budget problems and by the Challenger disaster. Ironically the NASA error that caused the Challenger tragedy was similar to the one that led to the Hubble telescope being launched with a defective mirror - unwillingness to accept technical warnings when there was great pressure from above to go ahead. In the case of the Hubble telescope, also built by NASA with help from the European Space Agency, a more basic machine revealed the problem with the mirror, but those in charge did not believe it because a newer, more complex machine had given the go-ahead.

The problem was put right by astronauts in 1993 - the telescope was always designed to be serviced in orbit - and since then its position outside the Earth's atmosphere has enabled it to record many detailed visible light images that have enabled scientists a deep view into space, leading to new theories in astrophysics.

The telescope is estimated to remain in working order until 2030-2040.

At least one in four unwanted calls to your home phone are thought to be from scammers. Stay one step ahead with our tips.

Contacted out of the blue

Unsolicited calls should always be treated with caution. If you're in any doubt, hang up, wait for a few minutes and call back on a number you trust.

No time to think

Professionals don't pressure you into making a decision quickly, or create a sense of panic, telling you that your broadband will be disconnected or that your bank accounts are under threat.

Asked to share personal details

Your bank will never ask you to move money to a 'safe' account or share your full online banking password, four-digit card Pin or security codes, such as those generated on a card reader.



Asked to go to your computer

Never let someone access your computer, or other devices such as a phone or tablet, unless you know the caller and their intentions.

Asked to keep quiet



Any attempt to stop you talking about the call to someone you trust (a friend, family member or independent adviser) is a red flag. Seek support before making a decision.



Spot the Difference

As the weather gets warmer, ladybirds are becoming increasingly active. On sunny days you may see them exploring bushes and flowers in search of aphids, which are a pest for gardeners but a favourite snack for ladybirds. In fact, they like them so much that a single ladybird can eat 5,000 aphids in a year!

There are 46 different species of ladybird in the UK, but the most common is the bright red seven-spot. This cheerful beetle is the one that

springs to mind when we think of the classic ladybird in a children's storybook, but ladybirds come in a wide range of colours and patterns.

Not all ladybirds are spotty some have stripes instead, and they vary in colour from sunny yellow to deepest black. These vibrant shells are also tiny suits of armour: the bright colours and bold patterns remind predators that they taste nasty, so after eating one, peckish

birds and mammals don't come back for more.

People used to think that the number of spots on a ladybird could tell you how old it was, but we now know that they are an indicator of species rather than age. Some ladybirds have useful names like the twenty-two spot, which can help you identify them, but there are some confusing variations in certain species.

For instance, the two-spot ladybird is typically red with two black spots, but it can also be black with four to six red spots. This is thought to be because it is more palatable than other species, so it mimics more toxic relatives to defend itself.



Another defence is to release a tiny drop of

liquid when disturbed. This may sound harmless enough, but the fluid they excrete smells horrible and contains a poison. It won't hurt a human but can be harmful to smaller animals, except for a few that are immune (such as swifts and swallows).

If you have ever held a ladybird you may have been on the receiving end of this unpleasant excretion, but if you can look past this they are great to have in the


garden, where they act as natural pest controllers.




